# CARMEL VALLEY HISTORICAL SOCIETY NEWSLETTER 

January, 2000

Happy New Year to everyone! We all survived the excitement of the holidays and the anxiety surrounding Y2K, thankfully. Now we are ready to get back to the business at hand and, perhaps, find some new ways of accomplishing our goals.

This past year has seen a great deal of progress made toward the building of a museum in the Village. There have also been some special events that have been very important to the Society and what the future museum will encompass. Here are some of those events looking at the year in review.

January - The Board of Directors began to look into some options for the type and size of building proposed for the museum. The Building Committee was reactivated to scrutinize these ideas and recommend their choices to the Board.

Paula West donated a pear picking machine, pear picking apron and Edison batteries for the museum.

February - Don Sweiss was welcomed to the Board as a new member.

March - The annual Monterey County History Day held at Monterey Peninsula College on March 13 . Several of our members attended to view the projects of the local students on the history of Monterey County.

April- Stephanie Culbert, working in close connection with the Goat Ranch Group at Rancho San Carlos, was able to obtain several original boards from the Joseph Wright cabin for the museum. This is the cabin where Robert Louis Stevenson spent his recuperating time in Carmel Valley in 1879. Stephanie took several pictures of the area and cabin remnants for our museum archives.

Roger Williams was welcomed to the Board as a new member.
Bernard "Buzz" Schulte gave a slide presentation and talk on the early days of Carmel Valley, at Sunset Center in Carmel. Several members attended the talk and had a chance to visit with Mr. Schulte. Leo Berta, who lived in the Valley during the same time Mr. Schulte did, added his own memories to the talk, giving the audience even more perspective. Schulte Road is named for Mr. Schulte's family.

Hank Ketcham gave the Society permission to print and sell up to 500 autographed Dennis the Menace-Rosie's Cracker Barrel T-shirts at our fund-raisers.
Barbara Marks left the Society nine albums of photographs of the early Valley scenes and residents, in her will. It is a wonderful collection of the early days in the Valley.

Monterey Peninsula Airport opened an exhibit of photographs of early street scenes in the cities of Monterey County. Fifteen members of the Society went to see the exhibit in a group outing.

May - Joseph Hertlein was authorized to do the preliminary drawings for the museum, and to be the liaison with the County for all permits and regulations that will be required for the building.

The Building Committee made a decision as to the type of building that would be best for the museum. The Board of Directors requested that a drawing and small model be built and displayed at the Cowboy Show.

June - The 7 th annual Cowboy Show at Hidden Valley Seminars, with performers Cliff Guinn, Belinda Gail and Wild Wind, Sourdough Slim, Bob Moore and Bill Ingram, plus winetasting, hors d'oeurves and a silent auction. The Society realized a profit of over $\$ 6,000$ from the show.

The annual Giant Rummage Sale at the Trail and Saddle Club, held in association with Wild Life. The Society received nearly $\$ 5000$ from participation in this event.

July - The drawings and model of the museum were shown to the Monterey County Historical Advisory Committee near the site of the proposed museum. The plans were met with approval and support by the Committee, which also offered some suggestions and cautions to be aware of when building the museum.

August - The donation of the California Gem, the Benitolite, was shown at the Board meeting. Mrs. Z's Gemological Laboratory in Pacific Grove donated the gem to the Society through Stephanie Culbert.

The Society's booth at the annual Carmel Valley Fiesta sold T-shirts, wine glasses, Ziegler photo prints and gave out Society information. Another $\$ 192$ was added to the treasury from these sales.

The Berta Family Ranch was sold and member Leo Berta donated many pieces of farm equipment to the museum for future outdoor display. The pieces were moved to Roger Williams property for storage and preservation.

September - The Society participated in Ranchers Days at the Trail and Saddle Club. Again T-shirts, wine glasses and photographs were sold and the Society gained $\$ 419$.

November - Mrs. Marie Pasquinelli donated many wineryrelated items to the Society, including a large wine vat, wine barrels, a wine press, antique platform scales and a steamer trunk. They will be a great asset in telling the story of vineyards and wineries in the Valley.

December - The annual Christmas Party was attended by about 45 members at the home of Stephanie Culbert. This is always a festive affair and "a good time was had by all."

We are very grateful for all the donations made to the Society during 1999, and for the people who have worked so hard to keep the museum progress moving. Our president, Ellsworth Gregory, has given many tireless hours to promoting the idea of a museum to the local business people. He never wastes an opportunity to publicize our fund-raising events to everyone he knows, and to persuade them to come and take part. We know that the Historical Society has almost become his "second job," and we appreciate all the work he has done to bring us so very close to our goal.

Joseph Hertlein, our Vice President, has been so helpful in putting the "dream museum" down on paper and building a model to help us visualize what it will look like. He worked up the comparisons of costs and needs for three kinds of buildings, so the decision could be made in the best interest of the Society. Joseph has worked with the authorities in the County, and has explained to the Board the requirements that will have to be met. His work and knowledge have been vital to this goal.

One of the truly unsung heros in the Society is Stephanie Culbert. In addition to her duties as Treasurer, Stephanie is our Librarian, and has bought about 300 books and pamphlets for the museum's library. She is always on the lookout for books where the Valley is mentioned, and for authors who have lived in the Valley, ready to make sure their books are a part of our heritage. Stephanie has also been our representative with the other historical groups in Monterey and the Valley. Without these terrific people, the Society would be a great deal poorer.

Our hats are off to Stew and Sandi Clough, two of the Society's founding members. With their daughter, Tammera, they are operating a residential day care facility in Redding, CA, and were recently honored by the Redding Chamber of Commerce for outstanding customer care at their center. They have only been in business for $1 / 2$ years, so this is truly an outstanding honor for them. Congratulations Stew and Sandi!

The Society has made excellent progress on the plans for a museum and the hard work done by our members is shown by the increases in the Building Fund. We are enclosing a copy of the financial report with this newsletter and hope that you will read it carefully. This could not have been accomplished without the dedication of the Board of Directors and the continued support from our members.

The new year promises to be full of excitement for the Society, as our progress toward the museum continues. We want our members to know there are several events through the year that will be worth putting on your calendars. Here are some of them, and we hope that all of you will participate.

Ft's finally happened! The lease for us to build our museum on property adjacent to the Community Park has been signed! At a joint meeting of the Carmel Valley Parks and Recreation Department Board and the Historical Society Board, the signatures were affixed to the agreement.

Our Historical Society President

Ellsworth Gregory and the whole Parks Department Board, President Dave Lyon, Dorothy McEwen, Sherrie May, Randy Randazzo and Nick Craft, are to be congratulated for their persistence and hard work in getting the Village behind our museum and making it a priority. The Parks bathroom, now under construction, will open after the first of the year.

A small and enthusiastic celebration toasted the completion of many months of deliberation for the best use of the land, coordination with the bathroom construction, and planning for the place our museum will have in the Community.

The Society will begin to go through the per-
mit process, getting the bids on construction and working on the final plans for the museum design. This work will start after the new year.

The museum will be a one-story building that will blend in with the atmosphere of the Village. It will measure $40^{\prime} \times 60^{\prime}$, and will be surrounded by a 10 covered porch. It will house a small office and a workroom. There will be lots of room for displays of our collections of artifacts. It is hoped that some of the features in the museum will be active, or hands-on, to be of more interest to all the students in the Community.

The Society has assembled many articles and newspapers from the earliest times in Carmel Valley, which will be available for research when the museum is completed.

The Society Board is very excited about being able to share with all of you this important first step to putting a museum in Carmel Valley. Our heartfelt thanks to all who made this "historic" agreement possible, and to our members who supported us every step of the way.

## FIRST HISTORICAL TOUR OF VALLEY A HUGE SUCCESS

It was one of those warm, clear, wonderful fall days, just right for doing something outside. Twenty members of the Historical Society met in the parking lot at Garland Park to go on an historical tour west on Carmel Valley Road to the Middle School.

## Dan and Maxine

Callinan gathered the group and outlined the sights that would be visited. Maps and short explanations of each were handed out. Dan told everyone to keep a sharp eye out for him in his yellow shirt he'd be the tour director.

Did you know that the gray house on the right side with all the geranium plants, just beyond Scarlett Road, was once called Casa Verde and was rumored to have been a hunting club?

Have you ever looked into the Canyon of the Natives? It's on the right, just above the Robinson Canyon Underpass.

Our first stop was the Carmelo School, which is now the site for adult education in the Valley. This one-room school was constructed in 1851 by James Meadows, then torn down in 1916 to build a two-room school.

There are several old homes along Carmel valley Road, not always visible, that are part of the history of the Valley. The group made stops at The Soberanes Home, the Meadows House, the Stewart House, and the Stone House.

Do you recall that little wayside on the right just past San Carlos Road, where fresh flowers always seem to just appear? It is a memorial to Indian pallbearers, who were bringing their deceased to the Mission for burial.

Have you ever noticed the trench behind the Carmel School District Offices? It was dug by the Indians in the early 1800's, to allow water to flow from the Carmel River to the Mission.

On the return trip to Garland Park, stops were made at the Hatton Barn, the Milk House, the Martin Ranch and the Farm Center.

There's a large, white building across Robinson Canyon Rd. from the Farm Center. At one time it was the center of social activity in the Valley, a place for suppers, dances and birthday parties.

Stephanie Culbert and Dolores McGlochlin did the research for all the planned stops, and Stephanie told the history of the houses, barns and other buildings along the route. Many of those on the tour were amazed at what they had been passing by each day, and very interested in knowing the history of how the Valley was built. At the end of the tour, everyone drove up to the Cooper-Lang house in Garland Park for a picnic lunch. It was a fitting end to a lovely morning.

## A QUERY FOR MEMBERS FROM OUR WEBSITE

TThe Society's Website, info@cvhistory.com, has received an interesting inquiry from a woman who lives near St. Louis, MO. (Alma) Lynn Wilmot Garrett said her sister recently found the original documents showing that their grandfather, Marcus L. Wilmot, homesteaded in Hitchcock (or Rattlesnake) Canyon in 1922 and 1934.

Her e-mail to us continues: "The land was sold in 1959 for $\$ 100$ an acre by the 5 heirs. I heard at one time from Jonathon Augustitus, who I believe still lives in the Valley, that the old homestead was bought by the county as a park. Do any of you know if that's a fact?"

Mrs. Garratt's greatgrandfather was born in Springfield, IL, traveled by wagon train to California as a teenager and settled in Pacific Grove. He worked for a time for a Mr. Birks who owned the Pacific Grove Bath House and pushed a wheelbarrow full of wet, soiled towels from the bath
house up Pine St. in Pacific Grove, for his mother to launder the towels. Mr. Wilmot's mother, Malinda Peckenpaugh Wilmot, later tragically drowned in the Carmel River in 1915 while fording the river near where Rosie's Cracker Barrel was built.

Can anyone remember if this homesteaded land was indeed purchased by Monterey County? And could part or all of this land be located in Garland Park?


Mrs. Garratt has generously offered to share with us copies of those orignal homestead papers, signed by Presidents Harding and Roosevelt as well as some family photos taken in 1935 at the homestead.

These papers and
photos will be a wonderful addition to our archives and in preparation for a personal section in the museum where stories, pictures and recordings of past residents can tell the history of how Carmel Valley grew.

## SOCIETY MOURNS LEO BERTA

Long－time local rancher and Society member， Leo Berta，passed away peacefully on October 25， 2003．He was 92.

Leo was one of 14 children who lived on the Berta Ranch in a very small house．His family raised cattle and Leo was part of many cattle drives over Laureles Grade into Salinas．He was of Swiss and Italian ancestry，loved to sing and even composed the Carmel Valley Song．

He was committed to saving the history of the Valley and when the ranch was sold，donated many farm and ranch imple－ ments，artifacts and maps for display when the mu－ seum is completed．He was an Honorary Member of the Society．

Leo and his wife， Mary Lou，（who died in 1996），raised 7 children and had 13 grandchildren．He was a great source of infor－ mation for CVHS because he had actually lived here during the formative years， knew the＂movers and shakers＂and how the Valley grew to what it is now．He always had a story about a building，a ranch，or a resident in the

Valley－he knew them all． Mott Hitchcock， who was a brother of the Valley＇s Joe Hitchcock and lived in Northern California，was so inspired by Leo＇s love of the Valley that he wrote a poem de－ scribing beautiful Carmel Valley．We are including the poem at the end of this Newsletter．

Except for a hitch in the Army in 1941，Leo lived his whole life in the Valley， and took his first and last breaths within two miles of the Village．He will be truly missed．

## OLD EUCALYPTUS TREES IN JEOPARDY

Carmel Valley residents who have traveled past the intersection at Carmel Valley Road and Boronda Road may have noticed the sudden disappearance of an historic eucalyptus tree facing Carmel Valley Road, on the northwest corner of the intersection. The tree was part of a row of historic eucalyptus trees which have existed along Carmel Valley and Boronda Roads at the site since at least the 1890s. (There is an 1898 photograph for proof). The trees may possibly date to the 1878-1881 time frame, when Rancho los Laureles Lodge owner, Nathan Spaulding, built the first of the Los Laureles Lodge buildings, and his brother-in-law, Kinzea Klinkenbeard, who lived with his wife in the

Boronda adobe, was said to have planted the eucalyptus trees. If so, that would make the trees possibly as old as 126 years. We know from the photo that they were in existence at least 106 years ago.

The eucalyptus tree currently in question was removed on October 5, 2004. This was following a recommendation made by the Carmel Valley Road Committee to the Monterey County Public Works Department, following the committee's September 30, 2004, meeting. There was no public notification of the tree removal nor was a hearing held for the public's benefit or input. The tree was removed only 5 days after the committee made its recommendation to Public Works.

## Carmel Valley

 Historical Society members may recall when, in 1990, then-Supervisor Karen Stasser-Kaufmann in responding to complaints of the accidents or possibility of accidents at that intersection, had recommended topping the trees. There was some talk around that time that County Public Works had indicated that it would like to simply remove all the trees as a visual hazard to drivers. After a huge public outcry, a statement was made in the Carmel Valley Sun by thendirector of of Public Works, David Collins, that"We won't do anything with the trees without conferring with the citizens of the area first. We've been reminded how important trees are to residents of your area."

However, two years
later, in 1992, the Carmel Valley Road Committee, aka Blue Ribbon Carmel Valley Road committee, was created under Karen StrasserKaufmann's tenure by the County Board of Supervisors. The purpose was to create a long-term plan for the Carmel Valley Road and to help the Public Works Department develop fees to improve the road without losing the "rural charter" that Carmel Valley residents want to keep.

The Committee is
made up of appointed citizens of Carmel Valley, coming from different representative geographical locations in the Valley, such as Cachagua, Mid-Valley and the mouth of the Valley. Also included in the Committee are two large developers (like Rancho San Carlos), the CHP, and members from the Public Works Department. Dave Potter, our Supervisor, Fifth District, is currently Chairman of this committee.

Created when it was and as it was, this advisory committee is not required to post public notice of its meetings as are the more recently appointed boards and committees, which now come under the requirements of the Brown Act. There are no term limits to the Carmel Valley Road Committee members and apparently the same members who were appointed in 1992 are still
serving.
Reasons cited for taking down the tree on October 5,2004 , were that over the past year a number of complaints have been received concerning sight lines for oncoming traffic at this intersection, plus potential county liability in the event of death by accident at the site. Also, there have been complaints by horse-trailer owners who claim they have difficulty in making the turn onto Boronda Road due to the tree's presence. A further finding was that the tree's roots were encroaching beneath the roadbed.

As a member of the Carmel Valley Historical Society, I will be working with the other members to submit an application to the County Historical Review Board to consider designating these eucalyptus trees as "trees of historical interest." If such a recommendation is approved, these trees will then come under the same protection currently afforded the walnut trees lining Spreckles Boulevard. Among the requirements for those threes are that, if one has to be removed due to disease or other hazard, it must be replaced with a new planting of the same species.

I will notify and send copies to your Board of Directors as well as to your Newsletter editor when this process has moved along sufficiently, for your consideration. Please help support your Society in ensuring these remaining historic eucalyptus are preserved as an important part of Carmel Valley's past.

Have you ever wanted to follow the trail taken by Lewis and Clark as they searched for a waterway to the Pacific Ocean? Well, you are in luck.

Nanci Lambert, from Bob McGinnis Travel in Carmel, is organizing a cruise on the Columbia River, to set sail April 8-15, 2006.

It promises to be a very interesting and informative cruise of over 1000 miles on the Columbia, Snake and Willamette Rivers in Oregon. The cruise will begin in Portland and will pass through eight locks and dams, view the dramatic cliffs and waterfalls of the Columbia River Gorge, visit historic forts and learn how the Native Americans, early missionaries and Oregon Trail pioneers lived during the early days of the Northwest exploration.

Historian Rex Ziak wil narrate the stories of the exploration and make the whole trip come alive.

The ports of call will include The Dalles, Hood River, Umatilla, and Pendleton in Oregon plus Clarkston/Lewiston, Longview, Mt. St.. Helens,

design and exhibit planner, Ileen Tuttle of the Museum on Wheels and Aitport Exhibits and Ellen Fondeler of the Carmel Middle School Habitat. There is so much to learn about putting the museum together and these women were so helpful in presenting the steps that will be needed to make the museum work for everyone. They reminded us this will be a slow and continuing process, and pointed out many ways for us to reach out to our members and the community to spread the word of our beginnings and then, our growth.
They outlined many ideas for our Archiving Committee to pursue in cataloging our artifacts and moving the organization of the museum forward. The committee realizes the Society will be working to open the "business" of a museum, and there is much to be explored and utilized. Eleanor Avila, a former librarian, also attended the meeting and has offered her expertise to get our own library organized. There is much to do. And we will need
many people to work on these projects.

In the coming months we will be working in small groups cataloging, photographing and organizing our artifacts. This will entail using a digital camera for detailed photographs of each item and a laptop computer to keep all records organized and available. The Society is in need of each of these items. If you would like to help us find these tools, if you are upgrading and could donate your used camera or laptop, we would appreciate it very much.

We will be using a computer program especially designed to facilitate museum artifact cataloging, one that is also used by the other museums in the Monterey area. The workers are a great group of people, and the atmosphere throughout the sale is upbeat and positive. The sorting of the items collected over the years has begun at our container (located at the rear of the Community Park parking lot). Before she can enter this information into the computer software, everything in the container will be gone through, sorted, discarded as the case may be, or designated for other uses. This can be a daunting job, but Maxine is eager to assess the information and artifacts so we can easily prepare for future exhibits in the museum.

## DOLLS, DOLLS AND MORE DOLLS!

Our Society has received a wonderful donation from Annie Marshall. Over the past fifty-five plus years, Annie has collected 600 dolls from over 80 countries and provinces, and she has given the Historical Society the honor of preserving and displaying them in our new museum. They are all ethnically dressed and each doll is indexed according to country. Pictures of the dolls are cataloged and on a CD.

Ann Flood recently interviewed Annie about how she came to receive all these wonderful dolls, and herein is a delightful story.

Annie's husband, Ernie was working in North Carolina and in 1950 was assigned to the International D rtment of Union Carbide. He traveled all over the world visiting more than 87 countries. He first brought back two dolls from Europe for their two daughters, Lindasue and Pamela.

Rather than having the girls play with the dolls, Annie taught them about the countries they came from and the dolls would stay on a shelf. The Marshalls had two more daughters and as Ernie continued traveling, he brought home more dolls.

Having the dolls in authentic dress helped Annie teach the girls about the different cultures around the world and their enthusiasm grew with each new doll. Ernie made friends with many of his customers and, on learning of the doll collection, many of them gave Ernie a doll from their native country. Later on, some of his customers' children stayed with the Marshalls as exchange students. And the Marshall daughters became students in other countries. The students were from Argentina, France, Germany, and Japan, and they stayed with Annie and Ernie for a year. At one point, the whole family moved to New Delhi, India where the girls went to school at the American Embassy School.

They traveled extensively throughout Europe and wherever they went, they added more dolls to the collection. Numerous friends and guests from all over the world came to visit them when they lived in Connecticut, and many of them brought Annie more dolls from places she and Ernie would never have had the chance to visit.

Every doll has a story behind it, and some stories are amazing. One
doll was brought to Annie by a couple from Rumania, which at that time was behind the Iron Curtain.

Many years later, Annie and Ernie visited Rumania and in one shop, Annie spotted a doll that was the female counterpart to the male doll she had received over 20 years before! When the Annie and Ernie celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary, several very unique dolls were made by a friend for the decorations - what a lovely surprise!

There is even a doll from Carmel Valley! Guiseppe, the Village jeweler for so many years, gave Annie a stuffed rabbit, his wife's favorite doll.

We extend our sincere thanks to Annie for her generous donation of the marvelous dolls to the Historical Society. They will be a wonderful addition to the displays in the museum, and for the extra education they will provide about other countries, cultures and connections to this Valley. Our thanks also to Ann Flood for interviewing Annie and bringing us this story.

# AN OPEN LETTER TO THE MEMBERS OF THE CARMEL VALLEY HISTORICAL SOCIETY 



The plans for the Carmel Valley Historical Society's Museum are moving ahead with some new designs and a change in our representative with Monterey County. Marj Ingram Viales, a respected designer in Carmel Valley Village, has been hired to work with the County and the various component planners to coordinate the master plan so a contractor can be chosen to erect the building.

When the Board first considered building a museum in the Village, it was hoped it would resemble many of the established buildings in the Village. A barn-type example seemed to be the least obtrusive for the area the Parks Department had leased to us. In March of 2003, Jerry Hecker, a local contractor, met with the Building Committee of the Society and explained how his company erected steel pole barns and stables for ranches in the area. He said the museum could be constructed in this fashion for less than a wood building. He outlined what the building would entail, how it would conform to the requirements of the Parks Department and how he would work with the Board on the sub-contractors for specific components , the building.

In June 2004; Farm Center Barns Contractor Mr. Hecker was invited to the regular Board meeting. He explained how he had worked with the Monterey County Building and Planning Commissions in the past and would be able to have the plans for the building drawn to the County's approval, including the engineering done by Blue Ribbon Barns, a firm in Los Angeles that sold materials for this type of building. He said the costs of steel had risen over the year, and were expected to rise $18 \%$ again before the 5 th of June and if the pole building was agreeable to the Board, he would strongly suggest buying the steel now, at the lower price, and he would store it at his facility until ready to use. The steel would cost $\$ 43,000$.

The Board spent a considerable amount of time in discussion regarding this purchase. In the end, it was agreed to buy the steel and store it with Mr. Hecker. One check for $\$ 38,000$, and a second for $\$ 5,000$ were sent to Farm Center Barns. We all expected the process to go forward easily and without delay.

In March, 2005, Joseph Hertlein, former Board Vice-president and our liaison with the County, informed the Board the County rejected the steel pole building. Mr. Gregory scheduled a meeting with Mr. Hecker to discuss this turn of events.

Mr. Hecker informed the Board that his firm would be able to build a wood building and the Blue Ribbon Barns would alter the plans to reflect this. It was not determined whether Mr. Hecker actually bought a specified amount of steel and stored it, or if he simply secured the needed amount of steel at the
lower price to have it delivered when construction began. In the latter case, it was assumed the money had been held in an escrow account.

In September, 2005, a special Building Committee meeting with Mr. Hecker discussed the finalized + is of the building and he presented the status of the Society's deposit with him. He said since there were changes in the building plans, architect charges from Blue Ribbon Barns of $\$ 12,485.10$, were deducted from the original amount. The balance of $\$ 30,514.90$, would be applied to his labor costs.

While the use and building applications were moving extremely slowly through the County System during the next two years, the Board went through several changes. Some Board members resigned, others came forward to take their places and with those changes, new ideas were brought forward, discussed and acted upon.

Unfortunately, in August 2007, we were dealt a blow when it was learned that Mr. Hecker had filed for bankruptcy. The Board immediately sought legal help to protect the Society's funds. In researching the situation, it was discovered that Mr. Hecker had defrauded many other firms and private citizens in the area and was seeking to have his debts erased in bankruptcy court. The Board will continue to pursue our options to determine dischargeability of the debt owed to us.

The Board has chosen to re-evaluate our position and to reach out to the Valley residents for more direction and support. In this spirit, in early September, we met with Todd Leuders, president of the - .nmunity Foundation for Monterey County, and his office manager, Judy Sulsona. As you know, the Society has had an account with the Foundation for many years. Both Mr. Leuders and Ms Sulsona, live in the Valley and are very much in support of the museum being built. The Board explained the progress that has been made toward building the museum - the fund-raisers, donations from many members, the support that has been received from various businesses and groups in the Valley, working with the County to get all permits required, the collection and storage of artifacts, and the construction bids from several local companies. The Board also explained the Hecker bankruptcy and loss of funds.

Mr. Leuders and Ms Sulsona felt that even though this setback was serious, it was not a collapse. There were many more positive elements on which to concentrate to move the project forward. Mr. Leuders supported the idea of expanding the Board up to 15 members and establishing an advisory committee outside the Board to offer suggestions and assistance. The Board totally agreed and is now taking the steps to request community support and involvement.

Ms Ingram, the designer, has been working with several people in the Planning Department to reinstate expired permits without extra charges, and to determine when we can go forward with the building responsibly at this juncture. We are aware that this event can expand our horizons and direct us to reach out 1. new ideas and help in making the museum a reality. By working with Ms Ingram, a great deal of progress has already been made with the permits and approvals needed by the County. Our intent is to go forward, to seek new Board members, to become a more visible and viable entity in the Valley. We ask for the help and support and patience of all our members as we implement our plans.

## THANK YOU FOR YOUR SUPPORT

We want to thank our members for their support and understanding as we deal with our financial loss. Many of you called to express disappointment in the unfortunate situation with u..y Hecker, but let us know that you are standing behind us in our quest for a museum.

The Board of Directors is moving forward on finding new members as well as looking for those willing to serve on the advisory committee in various capacities. Elizabeth and Richard Barratt, long time Society members and former members of the Board have agreed to come back and help in our work. We welcome them.

We are asking all our members to seriously consider beroming a part of the Board. At th__ moment, we especially are in need of someone to take over the membership organization. The renewal notices are sent out
every month, and someone with computer skills could set up this process for easier distribution. It would not be a difficult job, but one that is most necessary and would be appreciated.

Another very important need is for someone to become the Treasurer. A person with financial skills would be most welcome as most of the Society's accounts are not complicated, but must be kept separate and reported on each month. The Treasurer would work closely with the Board and the advisory committee in working on fund-raisers and membership events.


Our work with designer Marj Ingram is going very well. The permit process that had slowed has been accelerated and there is good news. A hearing is
scheduled for December 13th, for the approval we have been waiting for, and it looks very positive. After the approval, we will have time to work on finding a good contractor, setting up fund-raisers and moving forward on our project. In this vein, we again remind you that we are a 501(c)3 non-profit organization and all donations to our Building Fund are tax deductible. We continue to need your financial and active support. The Society is looking forward to doing all it can to see the museum built.

## SAVING THE TREES

Perhaps you have seen the signs on Carmel Valley Road calling attention to saving the eucalyptus trees at the intersection of Boronda Road. These trees are an important part of the history of the Valley and Monterey County has drawn up a plan to eliminate the trees as a traffic hazard. Concerned citizens have come forward to object to this plan citing the age and historical relevance to the area and their work is paying off.

## CARMEL VALLEY HISTORICAL SOCIETY NEWSLETTER

Kudos and high praise go to Elizabeth and Richard Barratt
their continuing and outstanding work preserving this row of eucalyptus trees. On Saturday, November 10, 2007, word was received from the State Office of Historic Preservation in Sacramento, that the State Historical Resources Commission unanimously approved recommendation for these trees to be listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

There were many months of working with the Monterey County Historic Resources Review Board and Supervisor ive Potter. Letters were sent to members of the Carmel Valley Association alerting residents to the proposed plans of Monterey County Public Works and through all these actions, the trees have won a reprieve.


The history of the trees goes back to the very early days

Carmel Valley, when Juan Manuel Boronda, his son Juan de Mata Boronda and Vincente Blas Martinez were granted the

Rancho Los Laureles 1839. The rancho comprised about 6, 625 acres running from the top of Laureles Grade to Snively's Ridge north to south, and from Carmel Valley Village to Garland Park, east to west. Both families lived on the rancho until 1851, when the Vincent Blas Martinez sold his share to the Borondas for eight horses, one mare, four tame milk cows and two tame milk cows with calves.

In 1868, the Borondas sold their share and it passed through several different owners until 1874 when Nathan Spaulding bought a half-ownership. He became a full owner in 1878 and owned it until 1881. It was during this seven-year period that the eucalyptus trees were planted by Kineza Klinkenbeard, a man who lived at the Boronda Adobe and was building his own home on what became the nucleus of Los Laureles Lodge.

According the memory of former long-time resident Joe Hitchcock, the trees began along Carmel Valley Road, and then continued down Boronda Road ending at the historic Boronda Adobe. So they have been a part of the Valley's history for more than 130 years and hopefully, will remain for many more years.

The official letter of
recommendation for the National
Register of Historic Places was
sent to Supervisor Dave Potter, and he forwarded it to the State Office of Historic Preservation. It will be sent on to the Keeper of the National Register is Washington, DC, who will have 45 days to respond with a yea or nay on its national recognition. If all goes well, in 45 days, Carmel Valley will have a major landmark of national importance! And the State of California will also have a new historic site.

## JANUARY MEMBERSHIP MEETING

The annual Cowboy Show has been one of the big evenings of the summer and new ideas about its format are now being considered.

We feel we have made a good start to including the membership more in making the museum a personal part of the Valley. We want all of Carmel Valley to remember this museum will be their museum. # OUR LITTLE <br> VALLEY - NOW NATIONALLY KNOWN! 

Would you believe little Carmel Valley, CA now has its own listing in the National Register of Historic Places? Well, we do, and it's all due to the efforts of Richard and Elizabeth Barratt and countless supporters of the historic place in our history the Boronda eucalyptus trees represent. Just check out the "official" listing at http://www.nps.gov/history/nr/nrlist htm.

As of January 10, 2008, the prov of historic trees, which 1.-cived the unanimous support from the State Historical Resources Commission in November 2007, and the Monterey County Historic Resources Review Board, won their listing in the National Register. The trees were planted in the 1870 's, first along Carmel Valley Road, then continuing down Boronda Road and ending at the historic Boronda Adobe.
While this registration gives the trees some notoriety, it does not completely protect them from the federal or state governments trying to attach restrictive covenants to the pronerty or trying to acquire them fo. suture alteration or destruction. The Monterey County Public Works officials are still working on
ways to do away with the trees, but they will have their work cut out for them. Many months of red tape and environmental review would have to be completed first. As Elizabeth has warned, "Be aware there may be meetings with Supervisor Dave Potter, public hearings and perhaps a final say-so by the Monterey County Board of Supervisors," if Public Works persists in their efforts to take down the trees.

In these days when too many older and mostly historic buildings and yes, trees, are being shoved aside for "modern conveniences", it's heart-warming to know there are people who are willing to stand up and say "Stop!" Again, our thanks to Elizabeth, Richard and their band of supporters who took the time and worked their magic on the "powers that be" to save our trees!

The Carmel Valley Historical Society Board of Directors wants to update our members on the situation regarding the building of the History Center. We are moving forward! We are making progress! Much work has been done, from design, plan checks and re-checks to plan approval and the necessary permits. The great news is that the Board has unanimously decided to move ahead with building construction. Grading activity is expected to begin before the end of this month (November). Substantial progress towards the completion of the History Center will be made by mid 2009. The Board decision to move ahead makes inconsequential a stumbling block, explained below, which the Parks Board has used to hinder our progress for the past few months.
. When the Society held a membership meeting in January, 2008, it was announced that the Carmel Valley Recreation and Parks Board, owners of the land where the Center will be built, had required the Carmel Valley Historical Society to provide a bond or assurance that the total funds for the building construction were at hand. At that time, the Society had over $50 \%$ of funds available, with pledges from other supporters. It has been our belief that once construction began and progress was clearly evident, more people would come forward with donations to finish the building completely.

President Richard Barratt and Building Committee Chairman, Reggie Jones, met with the Parks Board in July to explain that the building permits were already in the hands of our contractor. Even though they presented our current financial situation and the likelihood of more money becoming available as the building progressed, the Parks Board was adamant in their request for the full cost of the building and be in the bank under their control.

In an effort to show the Parks Board the Community support for the Center, petitions were drawn up and made available at the Carmel Valley Fiesta, at businesses in the Village, and at our second membership meeting held August 5, 2008. Over 250 people offered their signature in support.

Reggie Jones wrote to the Parks Board asking for a specific time slot to discuss the situation at their regular monthly meeting on October 15,2008 . The letter asked the Parks Board to agree to let the building begin with $60 \%$ of the total cost, or $\$ 250,000$, in the bank. The Society Board called members and Center supporters asking them to attend this meeting.

Reggie gave our reasons for approving the start of construction, detailing the months of work that went into obtaining the planning approvals and permits as well as their costs. He presented the Parks Board with the signed petitions and also explained how the denial of the project would affect the possible future of the Society as a whole.

Everyone was allotted time to give their views regarding the building. The main goal was to convince the Parks Board the asset the Center would be to the Village, the tourist draw, and the educational value with all the artifacts so close to the grade school. There were offers of donations of building supplies and other components for the Center. Past President, Ellsworth Gregory brought in solid pledges of $\$ 75,000$, bringing our available funds to over $75 \%$ of the cost. Tim Scherer, our contractor, indicated he could begin construction within the month.

The Parks Board then gave their opinions regarding the Center and ultimately voted 3-2 again, to deny the start of the building until the total cost was raised. No further discussion was allowed.

Because of the uncompromising position of the Parks Board, and the fact that the Parks Board required assurance of total funding, our Board sought legal advice regarding the terms of the lease agreement. It was their opinion that this is a unilateral modification to the original ground lease agreement, and is therefore not legal. We have unanimously decided to pursue the following option. We will first request that the Parks Board cooperate with us in the grading and construction activities. Should they not cooperate, we will still move ahead with construction, since this is our legal right. We have an obligation to all of our members and friends to do this.

Just in time for all our new activity, and thanks to the work of Richard and Elizabeth Barratt's son, Ned Henderson, a blogspot on the Internet has been designed and is now up and running. We can keep our members right up to the minute with our building progress. Newsletters and updates will be posted there plus valuable information about the Society. Check it out at:

We expect to achieve visible progress with our construction by mid-January."

The Board of Directors did not
accomplished this alone. We worked together with many loyal members who offered their knowledge and ideas to get the necessary permits approved. It has been a pleasure to work with all of them. The Community has shown us that the History Center will be an asset to the Village and we are dedicated to making that happen!

We also want to thank all of you who have responded with donations to our Building Fund. This has been a gratifying acknowledgment of support for the History Center from our members.

## WE'RE MOVING FORWARD!

As we look forward to a new year, it is a good time to remind you to round up those historic items you no longer use, but would like preserved, and put them aside. They can help reconstruct the history of Carmel Valley and be incorporated into exhibits that will tell the stories of how our Valley evolved. We would like to have the names of those who were here, what they did for a living, how they used the items you have saved and how your family became a part of today's Carmel Valley. It is a vital part of our heritage to know what happened many years ago that makes this part of the world the unique place it is today. We will be
making more information available on how your cherished items can be a part of our historical displays as the building progresses and we design the exhibits.

## WE ARE BUILDING!

The building on the History Center has begun! The footings have been dug, the grading has been done, the construction fence now surrounds the site and there is activity bustling all over the site! The big day has arrived and progress is being made at long last. All the waiting and planning and tweaking and working with the County has paid off and we're on our way!

Building Committee Chairman, Reggie Jones is keeping up to date with the progress of construction. He has reported "site excavation began at 10:30 AM on Monday, January 5th, and Regency Construction, our building contractor, has been making excellent progress.


Additionally, we are very pleased and encouraged by the very good cooperation between Regency, the Park Board and CVHS. As of Monday, January 19th, Regency has completed the sub excavation and recompaction, fencing, excavation for building footings, rough vlumbing. and underground
electrical for floor outlets. Re-bar was installed in preparation to pouring the concrete floor that was done on Wednesday, January 28th. The order for exterior doors and windows was placed Monday, January 19th.


Weather permitting, the ten-foot-wide concrete walkway around the building will be poured on February 12th. Framing will then begin, and the building exterior shell will be complete by early April.

We have sufficient funds on hand to complete the building shell and close it up. To proceed further, more funds are required. If our project was fully funded, the building would be completed by early June, and the exhibit area would require another two months, or so, to finalize. We could be open to the public in August. We are planning for this schedule."

When you pass the Community Park, watch the progress of our History Center. It will be a valuable addition to the Valley and is designed to blend in easily with the atmosphere of the Village.


## YOUR HELP IS NEEDED

After all the years of planning, it is wonderful to see we have actually started building the History Center. But even with the construction, the planning doesn't stop. There are many more details to be addressed - docents, times of operation, building maintenance, displays, programs, the list can go on and on.

Our greatest challenge is the need to raise more funds. The construction will be the biggest expenditure for us, and we also have to be prepared for detail changes and unexpected costs as they arise. Envelopes for joining our road to completion went out with the previous Newsletter and the response was very heartwarming. We are fully aware the current times make everyone more careful about where their discretionary spending goes. We hope that you will also realize how important a History Center can be to the Community. Not only will it present the story of how Carmel Valley evolved, but will be a research center for this area, a central meeting place for other organizations, a teaching "extra" for the schools and a valued tourist attraction.

## BUY A FLOOR TILE! <br> BE A PART OF OUR HISTORY!

Have you noticed the new display in the shop next to the Wild Goose Café in the Village? Mrs. Elizabeth Springer, owner of that part of the Village, has graciously allowed the Society to use that room promote our new fund-raising effort.

There will be a section of the flooring in the new History Center that will be covered with terra cotta tiles. We are offering our members and anyone else who would like to participate, a chance to be remembered by buying a terra cotta floor tile with their personal inscription embossed on the tile.

The tiles come in two sizes, 4 " $\times 8^{\prime \prime}$, and $8^{\prime \prime} \times 8^{\prime \prime}$. The smaller tile will have three lines available, with 20 characters on each line (including spaces) and are priced at $\$ 100$. The larger tile will hold six lines, also with 20 characters each, priced at $\$ 250$. There are also tiles in those sizes for businesses and organizations.

We are all very excited about this event as it will give all our residents and their families a chance to actually be a physical part of the History Center. Buying a tile would make sure others knew of your support for the Center. A tile could be a way to honor someone special in your family, or your children and/or grandchildren. A tile in memory of someone who meant very much to you would insure they would be remembered for years to come.

The tiles are very durable and can be walked on without damage. When friends and relatives come to visit, the History Center will be a number one place to visit so you can show off your actual part in the building!

Our Building Committee Chairman, Reggie Jones, is handling the tile orders and will be open to your suggestions as to how you would like your tile(s) displayed. He will work with you on arranging a series of family tiles together and in making sure your wording on each tile is as you specify.

Monterey County Public Works has drafted an EIR to try and take out $30 \%$ of our beloved local landmark trees to widen the road and make way for a left turn lane at Boronda and CV Roads that no one wants. Please write to the below officials and ask them to come up with an alternative to destroying our history. Some of us feel that moving the 35 MPH sign another 300 feet west would help slow traffic, many also are asking for a demand stoplight, which would not disturb the normal traffic flow on CV Road.

The family who lives at the corner of Carmel Valley Road and Boronda Roads is threatened with losing a large chunk of their property and having speeding cars, road noise, and exhaust within feet of their back deck if this road widening and turn lane project goes through. Not Fair! Not the Carmel Valley spirit! Please help stop this nonsense.

Construction progress continues very satisfactorily. As of May 2, all windows are installed, all exterior doors are installed, all roofing tar paper is in place and the exterior $8 \times 4$ wall panels have been delivered and are being installed. Before our next newsletter is published, we can confidently expect to
have the outside completely painted and the roof completely finished. If you haven't looked closely at the building, please do so. Both from the outside and inside, the design and construction is impressive. Our general contractor, Tim Scherer, Regency Construction, is doing a great job of ensuring that the highest quality is maintained while cost goals are being met. You can be confident that the funds that many generous people have donated to us are being spent frugally and responsibly.

As we have mentioned in our last newsletter, we have enough funds on hand to 'close-out' the building, but
we need another $\$ 150,000$ to complete the interior, meet all code requirements and bring everything to a point where we will be permitted to operate the building as a History Center.

We are greatly encouraged by the initial success of our 'Tile Project'. In one month, April, we have received slightly in excess of $\$ 10,000$ for tiles to be installed on the History Center floor. Many, many thanks to those who have donated and encouraged others to donate. Please help us to continue to reach out and sell more tiles. We feel we may have just 'scratched the surface' of a potentially very large funding source. This is rapidly becoming a wonderful community project and, of course, it puts the CVHS Board under a great obligation to deliver to you a History Center of which you can be pleased and proud.

## THE BORONDA TREES

We are sure you have seen the signs at the corner of Boronda Road and Carmel Valley Road alerting everyone about the threat from Monterey County to remove the eucalyptus trees from that corner. The trees were planted between 1874-1881 by Kinzea Clinkinbeard who was the brother-in-law and ranch manager for Oakland Mayor Nathan Spaulding, who owned Los Laureles Ranch at the time and who put in many modern improvements.

Through the tireless work of Elizabeth and Richard Barratt and a group of volunteers, the trees have been officially listed on the National Register of Historic Places.


Nevertheless, Monterey County Public Works has designed a plan to take down some of the trees as they feel that corner has safety concerns. Many Valley residents also think the trees present a hazard to those turning onto Carmel Valley Road from Boronda Road. However, research by

Elizabeth has proved that corner has fewer "fender-benders" than at other intersections on Carmel Valley Road.

The Barratts and new homeowner, Leslie Svetich, have been working with Monterey County Public Works to find a satisfactory solution to all the concerns at this corner. To show the support for keeping the trees, they have been collecting signature on petitions from many citizens in the Valley to present to Public Works and there are already over 500 signatures. # HISTORY CENTER CONTINUES TO IMPRESS

As of June 4, our History Center external structure is very close to completion. The walls were painted on Saturday, May 30, by TNT Painting and Decorating who provided their labor at no cost. We greatly appreciate their generosity. The painting effort was aided by several volunteer CVHS members. The roofing has been completed and all gutters and downspouts are in place. All that remains outside is painting the doors and installation of hardware. We expect external completion and to have the keys in our possession by Wednesday, June 10. If you have not already done so, we urge you to take a close look at the building. The structural design is very impressive, and the building contractors, very ably directed by general contractor Tim Scherer, Regency Construction, have done an excellent job down to the smallest details.

We are very pleased with all that has been accomplished to date, but we are now in a position of having exhausted available funds.

From here on, we can only continue with the building interior as funds become available. The first job increments we will aim to complete will be to install a security system and to get water, gas, electricity and telephone connections. This latter item will involve trenching out to Carmel Valley Road to hook up with the PG \& E system.

Regarding finances, we are very encouraged by the community response to our Tile Project. As of June 4, we have place an order for more than 125 engraved tiles, with a gross value of more than $\$ 17,000$. These tiles will be delivered to us in three weeks and will be ready for installation. A hearty "Thank You" to all who have ordered tiles. Please encourage your friends and neighbors to order a tile, and contribute their tax deductible donations to raise funds. Names and messages will be on display for years to come, and we will be able to continue with our building project.

If you feel you can not order
a tile just now, please remember the possibility of ordering a tile for you and your family will continue even after the Center opens. We are hoping to have our floor covered with these tiles depicting the people who live here and ensuring their place in the history of Carmel Valley. As residents and visitors come to the Center, profits from the tiles will help sustain our building and enable us to bring you more exhibits and interesting events.

## BORONDA TREES UPDATE

On May 8th, the Committee to protect the Boronda trees along with several local interested people, met at the Trail and Saddle Club with Yazdahn Emrani of Monterey County Public Works, and two of his assistants.

Public Works has indicated several trees should be eliminated at the corner of Carmel Valley Road and Boronda Road for safety reasons. Richard Barratt chaired the meeting and led the discussion of the many other solutions offered to solve that problem and would protect the trees. During the discussion, it was discovered the consulting firm that made the drawings of the corner had made some mistakes and they will have to be corrected.

There was a great deal of mutual understanding gained through this meeting, and the Committee was encouraged by Mr. Emrani's desire to find a solution that will address the concerns of everyone.

# THE HISTORY CENTER, THE TILE SALES: WHERE WE ARE

Since our last newsletter was published the building exterior has been completed-as expected. Door hardware installation and door painting is finished, and we have the keys to a very impressive building. At the same time, our available funds have been depleted-as expected, and we are currently in debt to our building contractor. Principally due to a very generous contribution which CVHS has received, added to steady income from our tile program, we will fully retire our debt by the end of the month. After that, as we have stated before, we will proceed on a "pay as we go" basis.

Our first task increment is an expensive one: to get electricity, gas and water to the building. This will involve hooking up with PG \& E and trenching out to Carmel Valley Road. Among other things, this will enable us to install a security system and a sprinkler system, both of which are priority items. This could cost up to $\$ 30,000$. We'll have a current and more precise estimate in the next week or two. The total cost estimate to complete the building
interior and meet all building permit requirements for public occupancy is $\$ 150,000$.

Our engraved tile program continues to generate significant funds, and we are extremely grateful to the very many who have contributed donations for the tiles. Not only are we receiving donations from Carmel Valley and Monterey Peninsula residents, but also from various places around the country. (We have yet to receive a tile donation from overseas!)

There are two banners on our building, one on the driveway side and one on the parking lot side.

The number of tiles donated at this time is 179 , having a gross value of $\$ 24,900$. Please continue to "spread the word" and encourage friends and neighbors to participate. Our exhibits at the Mid-Valley Shopping Center next to Safeway and in the village next to the Stirrup Cup (where June Plumlee is doing such a yeoman service for us) continue to generate donations. These have been very successfully supplemented by the Hair Flare event on July 11 (many thanks to

Marj Ingram) and also an article published in the Pine Cone on July 4. Extrapolating numbers, if we could "sell" another 1,000 tiles, we would gross another \$140,000 and our building would be essentially complete. This is not an "impossible dream" and we will, of course be also raising money by other means. We can do it: one tile at a time.

To initiate the work to get electricity, gas and water to the building and install security and sprinkler locations, we need about $\$ 15,000$. To complete the task will require $\$ 25,000$ to $\$ 30,000$, total.

On August 17th, we received a second shipment of engraved tiles bringing the total received to 185 . Additional donations this month bring the total to 199 , with a gross value of $\$ 27,500$. CONSTRUCTION IS SET TO BEGIN SECOND PHASE

The good news is that we have accumulated sufficient funds so that we have begun activity on the next phase of our construction. We are hooking up utilities, gas and electricity, and may soon begin trenching to Carmel Valley road to obtain an independent water supply for our sprinkler safety system. This may not sound or look impressive, but it is an essential next step in building construction and will cost between $\$ 20,000$ and $\$ 30,000$. Initial steps, already taken, have been to transmit a deposit of $\$ 5,000$ to PG \& E and provide them with three sets of plans, per their requirement. Most of this construction phase is expected to be completed in November. A similar accumulation of funds will be needed for the next phase.

The not-so-good news is that the rain gutters received some damage, shortly after the last heavy rainfall, as a result of an unidentified truck driving too closely to the safety fence and striking the protruding gutter at the building corner. The damage is not extensive but is clearly visible. We shall take action to preclude a recurrence.

We are very grateful for continued donations for inscribed floor tiles. Tiles donated to date total 235, giving us a gross income of $\$ 33,600$.

This amount is very significant, contributing to our ability to complete building external construction and to continue the incremental building phases such as utility hook-up described above Please continue to ask your friends and neighbors to donate a tile. We can finish the project if we sell one thousand more (CV population 16,000 ?)

In our May newsletter we reported that Holman Ranch had very generously donated a 1920 Player Piano that had been owned by Mrs. Vivian Holman, for display in the History Center. We are grateful to Holly and Zan Hansen for storing the piano since that time and thus depriving themselves of the intended use of their garage. On October 17, utilizing transportation kindly supplied by Rod Mills, the piano was moved into storage at the home of Susan Moein, CVHS Board Member where it will remain until it gets placed in the History Center.


Board member Elizabeth Barratt's new book on the History of Carmel Valley is scheduled to be in bookstores by January 25, 2010. There are book-signing dates already in the works and she will be speaking to the Carmel Valley Women's Club and she
will be making a Power-Point presentation at the Carmel Valley Library in the spring. Elizabeth spent many months researching the history of the Valley, talking to ranchers and other residents, and gathering pictures to illustrate the beginning growth of the Valley up to the establishments of the local wineries. The book will be available at Border's, Barnes and Nobel, Costco, other local bookstores plus Amazon.com and Borders.com. We encourage you to buy a copy as the royalties from those sales will come directly to the Society. Many kudos and thanks to Elizabeth for this vital contribution to all the people who live in Carmel Valley.

And we know they often need new horseshoes. We are offering a place to donate those used horseshoes, a place where the horse will be remembered in our History Center.

PRESIDENT'S CORNER

I was very graciously offered the pportunity to moderate the Carmel Ialley Association's program "Carmel lalley Voices" on the 13th of September his year. This was a delightful prospect ;iven my role as President of the Carmel /alley Historical Society, and one to which I readily agreed. This was even nore agreeable in light of the fact that wo of the three "voices," Ruth Peace and .ou Allaire, are members of the Society, and Ruth is a member of the Board of Jirectors. Unfortunately, Lou underwent urgery the Friday before the event and vas unable to attend. On his ecommendation Roy Kaminske, another nember of our Society, agreed to step in or Lou. Rounding out the panel was Nalt Victorine.

The panel represented the historic range of the Valley: Walt the Western portion or mouth of the Valley, Roy the nid-Valley sector, and Ruth the Eastern r Village sector.

Walt was born down on the soast in the Point Lobos/Carmel fighlands area where he's lived all his ife. He attended Bay School and was a Monterey County deputy sheriff for 30 pears. Walt's great-grandfather was a Portuguese whaler who settled at the whaling station at Pt. Lobos. His great-aunt married Joe Hitchcock and settled Hitchcock canyon. He remembers he Valley full of red pears before WW1.

Ruth admitted to being 87 years old, and has been in the Valley since 1930 when she came with her widowed nother. Her mother ran the Carmel Valley Tavern (now Wills Fargo) as a restaurant and tea room. The family lived on the other side of the archway. Ruth
beyond the village overlooking Camp Steffani - 18 pupils in 8 grades. After her mother remarried (Mr. Brownell), they moved around the county, eventually settling back in the valley. After the war Ruth married Franklin Peace of the Valley. She taught at Carmelo and Tularcitos Schools for 24 years.

Roy was the relative newcomer to the Valley, living here since the early 1950's following a career with the United States Army. Roy's interest and involvement in real estate matters made his insights into the evolution of the Valley especially interesting in light of recent political discussions.

The question and answer period following the panelist presentations evidenced the interest the audience holds in our historical background. What better comment on the need for our evolving History Center to provide a resource for further study and research for present and future generations? Our thanks to the panelists who participated in this delightful afternoon, and to the membership of the Carmel Valley Historical Society who continue to support our efforts in moving forward with our evolving History Center.

## SHERIFF MAKES VISIT TO BOARD

In July, Sheriff Mike Kanalakis and Commander Tracy Brown visited the monthly Board meeting. This gave us a chance to talk with them on the concerns the Board has about the new building and the sheriff's ability to protect the area. Sheriff Kanalakis explained that there had been cuts of up to $7 \mathrm{I} / 2 \%$ in the budget for the county and they were doing their best to keep the area well protected. With the visible office in the Village, and the obvious parking of a patrol car in front of it, he felt it was a reminder to visitors and residents of their

Board members expressed their concerns about the speeding through the Village, and on Carmel Valley Road in general. The sheriff said he knew that the Road is a dangerous one, especially at night, and they were working as diligently as they could to deter speeders. He said he would definitely look into having a bigger speed limit signs at both entrances of the Village.

The Sheriff noted that the California Highway Patrol has expressed interest in having a visible presence and sharing the current office with them. There are some requirements that would have to be met before a CHP "speed designator" trailer could be stationed near a Village entrance to slow down traffic. He encouraged anyone seeing a speeder in the Village to get the license number and car description and notify the sheriff's department.

## Commander Brown

explained that while drivers don't appreciate "routine traffic stops," there are times when drugs, drunk drivers, weapons and other contraband have been found during these stops. Getting these people off the roads and out of the area is part of why these $s$ stops are made.

Both Sheriff Kanalakis and Commander Brown empathized the department is more than willing to work with the local residents of all communities and if they have concerns or want questions answered, to call the department and explain the problem or ask for one of the deputies to come to talk to the local group. The enforcement of the laws works both ways, and cooperation with the department and citizens will result in a much better relationship.
