PROGRESS!

As shown in the photograph, the Park Board has begun working to pave the parking lot adjacent to the History Center. CVHS is financially responsible for 8 of the approximately 24 total parking places. After extensive interaction with Cal Am, the Water Board, PG & E and the Park Board, and also selecting a sub contractor (Monterey Peninsula Engineering, MPE) to dig the required trenches, our contractor, Tim Scherer, (Regency Construction) has amassed all the necessary paperwork red to move ahead and bring water, gas, electricity, telephone and TV cables into the History Center.

Trench excavation is expected to begin at the end of next week (June 18). The work will be coordinated with that for the parking lot paving so as to minimize duplication of effort. As a security measure, we plan to install external lighting, actuated by motion sensors, as an initial task after utilities are hooked up. Following this, we will begin the tasks remaining to complete the inside of the building–funds permitting!! We are deeply grateful for your encouragement and support.



He spent an hour with us walking through the Center and suggesting different ways of using the wall space, putting emphasis on certain special displays, maximizing the use of corners and giving us tips to make the Center a source of interest for the whole Valley.

He showed us how to make the traffic flow easily and progressively through the Center, how to make a tour more interesting to field trips by students and gave us hints on making the best use of lighting. He pointed out some places where we could find many ideas on displays, storage and partition placements. We are very grateful for all of his information.

NEWS FROM THE CARMEL LIBRARY

Thirty years – and we didn't even celebrate....

The doors of the present Carmel Valley Branch Library opened on February 5, 1980, in what had been the Buckeye Restaurant. Before settling in this building, the Library was located in Mrs. George Koch's home (1938), the Box Stall (1948) and the back of the Post office/Irene Baldwin's Real Estate building (1949). This last building now houses Lobos and Jim's Window Cleaning.

In 1958, the Library moved to the front of Mrs. Baldwin's building and increased the space in that building in 1967. In 1979, the Library finally moved to The Buckeye Building and opened their doors for business in early 1980. We have come a long way, haven't we?
