

HISTORY QUESTIONS **ANSWERED**

In our last Newsletter, Elizabeth asked if anyone could remember who owned the "In and Outdoor Shop" and how many businesses have been in that particular space. Skip Marquard of Porter-Marquard Realty, searched his memory and gave us this answer:

"I believe that the In and Outdoor Shop and the property was owned by Mrs. Wilson. She had a very fine art gallery in the building that is currently occupied by the fish restaurant. I also believe that her ownership included the barn and land located behind the

strip of shops, which was the first home of the Hidden Valley Theater. That theater was started by the late Sally Church and Barbara Cook. Sally went on to build the current Hidden Valley Theater."

For anyone wondering about the history of Rosie's Cracker Barrel, he added: "The Rosie's Cracker Barrel building was the real estate tract office for Robles Del Rio Carmelo Subdivision, which was developed by my Grandparents, Frank B. Porter and Jet L. Porter. They also built Robles Del Rio Lodge and a small nine hole golf course, which is now the open space meadow in upper Robles. My Grandparents deed restricted that land so it would not be developed."

And the real estate office at Boronda and Carmel Valley Roads also has a family tie, as he explains:

"The first Porter-Marquard Realty office was built by my uncle, the late Paul F. Porter and my mother, Peggy Porter Marquard, and was built in it's present location at the corner of Carmel Valley and Boronda Road in 1948. It was built to serve as the tract sales office for the Rancho Del Monte Subdivisions which include: the Rancho Road Middle Canyon, Phelps Way, Country Country Club Drive, Laurel Drive, Boronda Road, Aliso Road, Garzas Road. We used the Rancho Del Montename again for the subdivision my uncle and I did for the late William May Garland & Richard Volpertoff the west end of Garzas Road in 1970's."

We also received an answer from Fawn (Nicholsen) Remington, who now lives is Widefield, CO, and grew up in the Valley with fond memories of this area.

"YES!! I do remember the In & Outdoor shop, with many fond memories. After school my best friend, Marian Murphy (who now lives in Spokane WA with her family)and I would stop there before walking up the hill across the airstrip to Marian's home on El Caminito. Marian's mom, Betty Murphy was the book keeper for the In & Outdoor Shop. Does anyone else remember the wonderful aroma in the shop? I still keep in contact with Marian. In a recent conversation I asked about what made the shop smell SOOO nice. Any guesses? The drawers in the shop were lined with shelf paper the shop sold by the roll. I will never forget that lovely aroma.

YES !! I do also remember the first Thunderbird bookstore, it was so tiny! I was disappointed when the location was moved to near the Wagon Wheel & Wolters Market. I also remember when that space was the Post Office. What other businesses were in the same strip as the In & Outdoor Shop? I only remember the Madonna statue & the Milkhouse."
